

St. Peter's Parish History Update 2008 - 2017



Rev. Fr. Peter Keller was pastor with Rev. Fr. Peter Poel as associate pastor in 2008. The St. Peter's restoration program was completed by *Jeffrey Bros. Construction Ltd.* from March to May 2008, under Dave Durand's supervision. The work included soda blasting, new carpet, and the painting of the walls

and ceiling.








Newly renovated, St. Peter's Church, St. Joseph, 2008

Several statues were taken to London to Joe Valerio for repairs and restoration. He noted that the statues were over 90 years old and priceless, in that statues of that calibre were no longer being made. Volunteers took part in the "Parish Grounds Improvement Bee," held on May 29, 2008 to beautify the church grounds.

A committee was formed and preparations were made for the July 12-13, 2008 135th Anniversary Celebration, of the building of St. Peter's church. Saturday, July 12th featured an evening of local entertainment beginning at 7 p.m. On Sunday, an outdoor Mass was celebrated by Bishop Ronald Fabbro and followed by a lunch. Over 500 people registered for the event. The celebration provided an opportunity for attendees to view historical displays, renew old friendships, and visit



with family and friends. Activities were available for the children. The booklet, "St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church, St Joseph, Ontario: In celebration of the 135th Anniversary 1929-July 13, 2008" updated the parish's history.

A variety of entertainment was available throughout the celebration.










Members of the planning committee included: Dennis and Lydia Ducharme, Phil and Patty LaPorte, Dianne and Mike Miller, Martha and Ken Mungar, Dianne and Mark Tucker, Larry Langan, Rev. Fr. P. Keller and Rev. Fr. P. Poel. "Memories of the 135th Anniversary Celebration", a photo CD was produced and made available to parishioners after the event.

The Cemetery Board purchased a columbarium for cremated remains. Each niche holds two urns.





The English Martyrs church in Bayfield was closed in 2006. The sale of the building was finalized at the end of 2008 and part of the revenue was used to repay the diocesan loan for St. Peter's restoration program. The balance of the money was set aside for future repairs and future restorations to the church hall.

Rev. Fr. Peter Poel, associate pastor, left the parish at the end of September. As part of re-clustering, October 5th, 2008, Immaculate Heart of Mary church in Grand Bend was paired with Sacred Heart church in Parkhill, leaving St. Peter's and St. Boniface together, with Rev. Fr. Peter Keller as pastor.

Since St. Brother André's earliest visit, many parishioners have felt a close bond with this humble man. Each week, at the Tuesday Mass, the "Devotions to St. Joseph and St. Brother André" are said.

A bust of St. Brother André, donated by Bette and Richard Bedard, is proudly displayed in the church to commemorate his visits.

2009

In June 2009, the statue of Mary, originally from École Ste Marie was taken to Joe Valerio in London, for restoration.

St. Peter's Saturday Night Choir was nominated as one of the top three choirs in the area at the Grand Bend Winter Festival.



June of 2010 marked the arrival of Rev. Fr. Graham Keep. Brother André was canonized in October and arrangements were made so parishioners could come together in the Narthex at St. Boniface, to view it on television.

The parking area at the front of the church was removed and the entire lot repaved. A new entrance

and washroom were built at the back of the church and the parking lot was extended with added wheelchair access.









Water taps were installed outside to facilitate the maintenance of the flower

beds in the cemetery and on church grounds.

2011

There was an increase in grave interment rates in January 2011.

St. Peter's Parish was the first stop for the Visitation of the Major Reliquary of St. Brother André from April 29 to May 2, 2011.



The St. Brother André artifacts owned by Marc Cantin were on display.

"The Friends of St. André", a committee of interested parishioners, held an "idea" meeting to discuss the creation of the "St. André Healing Garden" on the south side of the church in October of 2011.

In 2012, The St. Joseph Historical society purchased 15 new tables for St. Peter's parish hall.

The building committee, led by Don Oesch included John Grellette, Ken Mungar, Pat Jeffrey, Peter Jeffrey, and Mark Tucker (retired). Between April 30 and May 12, a number of volunteers came together and prepared and painted the walls of the church hall.

Anthony Hartman became Secretary Treasurer of St. Peter's Cemetery Board, replacing Phil and Patty Laporte. A social was held, in appreciation of their many years of service.



The St. Joseph and Area Historical Society sponsored "Grave Matters", a dramatic presentation focusing on several families whose ancestors were among the original settlers. The performances were held in the cemetery.

2013

The bell tower was reinforced by Jeffrey Bros. Construction Ltd.

A special Mass was held on Monday, July 8, 2013 at 7:00 p.m. to mark the 140th Anniversary of the building of the church. A coffee social was held the day following the 10:30 a.m. Mass.

The parish was once again blessed with a visitation of the Major Reliquary of St. Brother André in 2013.





Rev. Bishop Ronald Fabbro officiated at Mass.

David Johnston arrived at St. Peter's and St. Boniface parishes in June of 2013 as a seminarian intern. By October, he had achieved the Ministry of Acolyte, which gave him the ability to serve at the altar and assist the priest and deacon.

2014

All of the kneelers at St. Peter's were removed and sent away for restoration. Groups of fifteen to twenty units were removed and reinstalled each time to permit continued use of the church.

A new organization, Christian
Men of Bluewater (CMOB) was
formed in 2014 to support and
equip men to stand up and live
the life they were called to by
their Lord and Saviour Jesus
Christ. The group met regularly
and focussed their discussions
around specific study programs.
Members of this group were also

actively involved in parish events. The group dissolved at the end of 2017.

A dedication ceremony of the St. Brother André Healing Garden was held, August 9, 2014. Rev. Fr. Louis Mousseau O.F.M. CAP, a descendant of this parish community, presided at the dedication. An outdoor Mass, followed by a pulled pork and beans meal marked the occasion.

Three birch trees were planted beside the Healing Garden Stone in recognition of the name given to the community by its first settlers – Pointe aux Bouleaux / Birch Point. Between October 2012 and December 2014,



the Friends of St. André
committee were able to
complete and pay in full, the
cost of the St. André Healing
Garden. The large cross in the
garden was built by
parishioner, Peter Jeffrey.
Using remnants of the wood,

he also fashioned small crosses, which were blessed and offered to parishioners and visitors.

The Kneeling St. Brother André statue was sent away to be restored. It and the statue of the Sacred Heart were given new bases by *Al Dunn Masonry*.







The statue of St. Brother André praying to St. Joseph and the child Jesus was commissioned by Joe Cantin in 1955, with the financial support of his fellow parishioners.



The walkway was added in 2017.

Farewell parties were held for Rev. Fr. Graham Keep and David Johnston who were transferred to St. Thomas, Ontario in June. One such event was held at the Bluewater Rest Home.

On October 13, 2014 Rev. Fr.

Matthew George was officially installed as pastor of St. Boniface and St. Peter's parishes by the Episcopal Vicar, Rev. Fr. Phillip Joseph at the 7:00 p.m. Mass.

In November the Building
Committee postponed the
installation of storm windows until

the spring of 2015 because of ongoing scheduling problems with the window

company. A group of volunteers decided to build and install temporary storm units in order to protect the leaded glass over the winter months.

2015

A task force for the Future of Pastoral Care in the Diocese was formed.



Major renovations were made in the hall. The upgrades to the church hall included a renovated kitchen, a larger refrigerator, new cupboards and sink, a fold down counter and service window. Parishioners were asked to vote on whether or not to keep the stage. Forty-one were in favour of its removal and two wanted it kept. The stage was removed. Two new exterior doors were also installed.

Mass was celebrated on the feast day of Saints Peter and Paul and parishioners were given the opportunity to be blessed with the parish's relic of St. Peter.

The original certificates of authenticity for the relics owned by St. Peter's Parish are found at the Diocesan Archives. Copies have been included in the Appendix.

New storm windows were installed in the church.

Bluewater Plumbing & Heating installed a backup sump
pump system in the church basement.

David Johnston was ordained to the transitional diaconate by Bishop Joseph Dabrowski at St. Peter's on June 1st, 2015.

2016

Cracks in the narthex wall and ceiling were repaired and repainted.

The Muhammed(s), a family of Syrian refugees were sponsored by the parish and welcomed to the community in February 2016. A number of volunteers helped the family adjust to their new home and country.

Rev. Fr. David Johnston was ordained to the priesthood on April 23, 2016 at St. Peter's Cathedral Basilica in London, Ontario.

A social was held to celebrate Rev. Fr. Matt George's, 20th Anniversary to the priesthood.

On August 7, 2016 the newly installed corpus on the cross in the St. André Healing Garden was blessed. The event was followed by a social in the church hall.

The reorganization of parishes into Family Groups by 2025 was introduced to parishioners in September.

2017

Central air conditioning was installed in the church by *Bluewater Plumbing* & *Heating*. And a new 100 amp electrical service was installed in the church hall by *Ray's Electric*.

2017 marked the 100th anniversary of St. Brother André's first visit to St. Peter's Parish in October of 1917. Under the leadership of Phil LaPorte, several volunteers organized monthly events and historical displays to acknowledge and commemorate St. André's presence in the

parish. Other members of the committee included: Patty LaPorte, Loretta Ayotte, Charlene Oesch, Nancy Robison-Jardine, Elaine Ducharme, Anthony Hartman, Pauline Cantin and Elaine Coxon



Families living in the parish in 1917 were honoured in a Family Posters display in the church hall. Descendants of these families who entered into religious life were also given special recognition. Monthly events consisted of "Coffee Sunday" style socials each


focussing on a theme related to the life of St. André. Students attending St. Boniface School participated by preparing art work for the hall. Music teacher, Christa Ducharme and several of her students entertained parishioners with French Canadian folk songs in November.

The two major events for the year were the *Parish Reunion Barb*ecue in August and the *Visit of the Major Reliquary of St. Brother André* in October. Marc and Pauline Cantin, with the support of Rev. Fr. Patrick Beneteau of the Diocese of London, brought the Major Reliquary to area schools, the Bluewater Rest Home and St. Peter's parish.

Major additions to the church grounds in 2017 included the creation of the St. André Rosary Garden and a new walkway to the Sacred Heart and The Kneeling St. Brother André statues. A duplicate of the Kneeling St. Brother André statue was donated in




2017 and installed at the back of the Rosary Garden. The statue was restored by Peter and Pat Jeffrey and its base was made by Tony and Phil LaPorte.

of the church grounds, and a postcard of the St. André Rosary Garden were produced as souvenirs. A booklet, "2017 – A Year with St. Brother André", highlighting the year's activities, was also completed. The family folders, a digital



backup of the photos and other information collected,



Saints Met". David Hartline, in his September 2010 article for *The*



American Catholic website explained that since neither could speak the other's language, "they did the only thing they could do in one language; they blessed

each other in Latin, the language of the Church." Hartline concluded,

"Both men came into this world with little fanfare, and despite their healing gifts they would continue living that way their entire lives. However, because of their humility God gave them a gift that the richest among us would be envious of having, the gift of healing. Because of this, they may have taught us all that humility and obedience, while frowned upon in the go-go world of the 21st century, is one of God's greatest joys." (*The American Catholic, 2010*)

History of St. Peter's Catholic Women's League

St. Peter's Catholic Women's League began in May of 1950, #1267 when the charter was received. The Spiritual Director was Monsignor Bourdeau, the president was Mrs. Louise (Remi) Denomme, and the secretary was Mrs. Esther (Alvin) Rau. The membership fee was \$0.50 and pins could be ordered from head office for \$1.00. Their mission statement states that the Catholic Women's League of Canada (CWL) is a national organization, rooted in Gospel values, calling its member to holiness through service to the people of God. The ladies wanted to serve their parish by raising funds for parish work and to support charitable groups in the area and in the world.

The parish hall was originally the responsibility of the CWL. The ladies paid for all repairs to the building and purchased the fridge, chairs, ceiling fans, and paid to have the wooden dividing doors made into 16 tables for use in the hall. They were responsible for cleaning the hall and the church until 1990 when people were hired to clean once a month. They supplied the church with flowers for special occasions, especially Easter and Christmas. In order to raise funds, bingos, card parties, dances, bake sales, bazaars, parish picnics, penny sales and "Get Togethers" with surrounding parishes

were held.
The first quilt

1966, the

ladies attended the Zurich Bean Festival to sell pies, baked goods, and

tickets on their quilts. This continued until 2003, when they no longer had a booth, but continued with their quilt raffles until 2016. Support was given to CNIB, Christmas candy and parties for school children, gifts and money to young women entering a religious order, and visiting shut-ins. For many years, money was given to the highest academic boy and girl graduating from Grade 8. This later developed into giving rosaries to all graduating students, which continues today.

Christmas treats were given to the École Ste. Marie students until the school closed. In more recent years, funding has been directed to Right to Life memberships, to Tony Milledge for Brother Bob, Catholic Church Extension Society, Development and Peace, Huron Day Center for the Homebound, Christmas Bureau (Family and Children Services), Sisters of the Precious Blood, Kids Help Phone, and Blessings Community Store in Zurich. Since 1981, they have sponsored the Save a Family Plan through the Diocese. Support was also given to the refugee family in 1979, and more recently in 2015-16.

As time progressed, the community changed, resulting in fewer parishioners. Discussions were held in 1974 about closing, and in 1989 the group became inactive for two years. With renewed interest, the women started again in 1990. Membership has ranged from 50 to 70 ladies.

The ladies were kept busy serving funeral receptions, ordination receptions, priests' anniversary receptions, priests' days of reflection, Knights of Columbus dinner meetings, first communion and confirmation receptions. The ladies have enjoyed pilgrimages to St. Marys, Midland and Merlin, fun nights in surrounding parishes, conventions in Windsor, Sarnia, Stratford

and London; interdenominational World Day of Prayer in local community churches and Christmas Wine and Cheese Parties.



History of the Knights of Columbus


Men from this area, interested in belonging to the Knights of Columbus organization, historically became members of the Fr. Stephen Eckert Council in Seaforth, Ontario. On January 7, 1985, a new council was formed in St. Boniface's Parish. The first Grand Knight was Mike Rau and there were 30 members. Some men from St. Peter's Parish joined the newly formed St. Boniface Council while others remained with the Seaforth group.

Members of the St. Boniface Council see their role as being a support to their parish. They volunteer where needed and organize a variety of events: monthly card parties, Euchre tournaments, a Ladies' Night Dinner and a Mother's Day Breakfast to name a few. Some of the proceeds are used to support the youth ministry in the parish, provide bursaries for students at St. Anne's Catholic Secondary School and gifts for St. Boniface's Grade 8 graduating class. Money has also been raised for both parishes' building funds and to help send parishioners to El Salvador to build houses for the poor. Junior and senior elementary hockey teams are sponsored each year for the annual Knights of Columbus tournament in Seaforth. The Council also provides much needed support for other worthwhile causes.




Attendees ate outdoors and explored the church grounds and the family poster and historical displays in the parish hall.

December - Preserving Our Past - Parish & Community History


The final event was held in recognition of the history of this parish community and the people who contributed to preserving its past. The two earliest unpublished histories were handwritten in French. The first covered the period 1858 to 1861 and was prepared by Rev. Fr. Auguste Wassereau. The next was written by Rev. Fr. Joseph E. Courtois' in 1900 who was able to interview a few of the original settlers who had moved from Quebec.



In 1929, Rev. Fr. Leo Marchand prepared the 30th Anniversary of Dedication of St. Peter's Church, French Settlement, Ont. booklet. The next parish history update covered the period 1929 to 1979 and was completed by Rev. Fr. John J. Bensette in response to a request made by the Diocese. In 2008, St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church, St.

Joseph, Ontario - In celebration of the 135th

Anniversary, 1929 – July 13, 2008 was published by members of the 135th anniversary planning committee and was sold at the celebrations held that year. Three new booklets were completed as part of the 2017 St. Brother André 100 celebrations: *St. Peter's Parish History Update 2008-2017*,

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
THE ROSARY GARDEN

THE BLESSED SACRAMENT



Begin your journey at the front of the church before the Blessed Sacrament, near the statue of St. Joseph and the reliquary of St. Brother André. St. Brother André spent much time in personal prayer before the Holy Eucharist. This was one of the special places that he loved to pray. With him at your side, acknowledge God here present and pray...

My Lord Jesus Christ, for the love which You bear to all, You remain night and day in this Sacrament full of compassion and of love, awaiting, calling, and welcoming all who come to visit You. I believe that You are present in the Sacrament of the Altar: I adore You from the proton of my heart, and I thank You for all the graces which You have bestouved upon me and in particular for having given me Yourself in this Sacrament, and for having called me to visit You in this church. Amen.

It is known that Brother André Bessette C.S.C. visited this area twice, once in 1917 and again in 1922, through the invitation of a local family. The basis of the invitation was for him to come for a "rest" from his rigorous and demanding life in Montreal. St. André attended mass at this church as part of his daily routine. Leave the church exiting by the front doors. Look to your left. You will see a statue of the Sacred Heart and beyond it you will see your next stop...

ST. JOSEPH & ST. ANDRE



In 1955, this statue of Brother André, St. Joseph and the child Jesus, commemorating Brother André's 1917 and 1922 visits was unveiled. Joseph Cantin organized the campaign to raise funds for the statue which was made in Montreal.

THE HEALING GARDEN




The Healing Garden was dedicated in 2014. A committee of interested parishioners undertook the task of creating an area for quiet contemplation and prayer. Birch trees were later planted as a reminder of the first French settlers who named their parish St. Pierre aux Bouleaux - St. Peter's of the Birch Trees. Although Brother André came here to rest, he brought his deep devotion to St. Joseph and the Holy Spirit's charism of healing to all! St. André healed many people in this community through the intercession of St. Joseph. There were healings of a physical and spiritual nature. St. André inspired a deep and lasting love of Jesus Christ through the intercession of St. Joseph which has been passed down from generation to generation.

Bro. André, I come to you in prayer for healing. (state your need) You were no stranger to illness. Plagued by stomach problems, you knew suffering on a daily basis, but you never lost faith in God. Now move to the Rosary Garden.




Throughout the Wide World

A Great Program of Festivities!

The parishioners created opportunities to meet every month of the year, highlighting the death of Brother André in January and his vocation as a religious in February with the World Day for Consecrated Life. Celebrations honoured carpenters in March, first responders and medical field workers in May, then farmers in June. A tapestry illustrating the church and Brother André inset was unveiled in June. The blessing of *St. André Rosary Garden* was on July 2. This original landscaping adds to the place of prayer named *St. André Healing Garden* where we find a statue of the religious and another of Saint Joseph surrounding Jesus on the cross. The families of St. Joseph met on August 6 to highlight the birthday of Alfred Bessette (born August 9, 1845). A cake had even been prepared for the occasion!

From One Trip to Another

One hundred years after Brother André's visit to this city on the shores of Lake Huron, the Major Reliquary of the saint is greeted from October 20 to 26 in various schools and parishes of the Diocese of London in Clinton, St. Joseph, Stratford, London, Pain Court, Windsor, Sarnia and Woodstock.

In October 1917, Narcisse Cantin had entrusted the hospitality of the religious to his son Napoleon by sending him these words in a letter: "He is a saintly man. Learn to know him. He will delight you with wisdom." Today, echoing these words, residents of St. Joseph and this region in Ontario are delighted and inspired by Saint Brother André, their friend and kind host.

Miraculous Healings

While visiting St. Joseph, Brother André met with many of St. Peter's parishioners, several of whom were healed of various ailments through his intercession.



Anna Etue, wife of Edward Etue, had a goiter medical problem for many years. In 1922, she was also suffering from internal bleeding and was not receiving any relief by medical attention. During Brother André's 1922 visit to St. Joseph, Edward Etue arranged for Brother André to visit Anna in the family home, where she was bedridden. During the visit, she asked Brother André to pray over her for relief from the goiter as well as the internal bleeding. Brother André responded that his prayers wouldn't be effective for the complex goiter problem, but he would pray for relief of the internal bleeding. Shortly thereafter, the bleeding stopped and didn't reoccur during the rest of

Anna's life. (This story was told to Margaret Mary (Masse) Brisson by her mother Genevieve Etue, daughter of Edward & Anna Etue, who was present during Brother André's visit to the family home. Prepared by: Paul Edward De La Franier, April 2017)



Edward & Edwidge (Gravelle) Denomme

Mrs. Edward Denomme was suffering from a "running sore" in her mouth caused by a bad tooth. This sore had been present for six or seven years. Edward Corriveau and his mother, Mathilda (Gravelle) Corriveau, took Mrs. Denomme to see Brother André. After her visit, she was completely cured and the sore never returned. (As told by Edward Corriveau.)

As a child, **Maxime Jeffrey** suffered from adenoids and had to breathe through his mouth and sleep sitting up. Brother André placed his fingers on the bridge of Maxime's nose and he placed his other hand on Maxime's head. He was able to breathe freely and his adenoid problem never returned. (As told by Maxime Jeffrey.)



Peter Denomme was dying from fluid on the lungs. Dr. O'Dwyer felt that Mr. Denomme would not last the day. Brother André came to



his bedside and prayed with him. Mr. Denomme immediately got out of bed. Prior to Brother André's visit, Mr. Denomme had been unable to swallow water without choking on it. By noontime, he was eating a large meal. (As told by Edward Corriveau, who was present.)



Zoé Tousignant was unable to walk without a cane. Brother André told her to throw the cane away. Much to her surprise, once she did, she was able to walk. (As told by Edward Corriveau.)

Jessiah Bedard walked with crutches. He went to visit Brother André, who told him that he no longer needed his crutches. After having a chat with Brother André, when Josiah was about to leave, he leaned over to get his crutches and Brother André again told him he didn't need them. Jessiah was able to walk without crutches, but did so in a slightly bent-over position. Jessiah Bedard worked in the Drysdale store. (As told by Sarah (Masse) Jeffrey & Gerard Geoffroi.)



Edward Denomme had asthma, which made it difficult for him to work his farm and support his family of 11. His daughter Priscille remembers her father as "a good and hard worker." His condition was treated by inhaling an asthma powder from a tin dish that looked like a lamp shade. Her father would often say, "If I only had my breathing..." Priscille's uncle from Michigan drove Edward to the Oratory in Montreal where they met with Brother André in the "little caboose." While placing one hand on

Edward's head and one on his chest, Brother André explained that while Edward would not be completely cured, he would be able to sleep at night, work his farm, and support his family. From that day forward, Edward no longer needed to use the asthma powder to breathe. (As told by Priscille (Denomme) Brandt.)

Emeline Jeffrey walked over to see Brother André about a painful tooth. When she arrived, he asked her why she had come. She explained that she was in pain because of her tooth. He replied, "But you lost it along the way." Emeline put her hand to where her sore tooth had been and was surprised that the pain was gone and the area felt fine. Brother André knew, before Emeline arrived, what her ailment was and that she had been healed. (As told by Gerard Geoffroi, her nephew.)





Séraphine (Masse) Bédard

While dining with Brother André in her home, Séraphine (Masse) Bédard was cured of an infectious tooth. Her daughter Beatrice was present. (A family story as remembered by Terry Davies, a great-granddaughter to Seraphine.)

"Mrs. Oscar Ducharme Jr. — a Picture of Brother André. She claims Brother André cured one of her sons in home here in St. Joseph from "taking fits." Urban Ducharme, now completely well, never took a fit afterwards." (As recorded by Napoleon Cantin in a notebook dated May 1st 1937)

S. Priscille Therese Ducharme

In 1922, Brother André cured **Charlie Rau**, then a young boy, of stuttering. His mother took him to see Brother André who was visiting at Joseph & Seraphine (Masse) Bedard's home at the time. (As remembered by John-Paul Rau in 2017, Charles's son.)





Dennis Charrette was born with a hernia and was required to walk with a brace. His mother took him to see Brother André at Seraphine (Masse) Bedard's home. Brother André told Dennis that he didn't need the brace anymore and Dennis was able to get around without it after that. (As told by Rev. Fr. Richard Charrette, his son.)

Napoleon Louis Denomme, born August 7, 1902, at St. Joseph, Ontario, was the third of twelve children of Philip Denomme and Anne Durand. When Napoleon L. Denomme ... was young, he had an accident and got blood poisoning. It was believed that he would lose his leg. Brother André, who was visiting St. Joseph, was asked to pray for him. After he prayed, Brother André told them that he would not lose the leg. When he died in 1975, he still limped, but he never lost his leg. (As recorded by Philippe L. Denomme.)

Malvina Courville (Mother of Aldea Larouche Denomme) was having a gallbladder attack. She dictated a letter to Brother André telling him how she felt and explaining that she had a large family to raise. She asked if he would pray for her. She was sick for 16 days and couldn't eat. When Brother André's reply came, the letter had prayers in it. Everybody knelt down and said the prayers. When they were finished, she started feeling better, sat up, and ate her first meal in days. She died some years later of an unrelated cause. (As written by Philippe L. Denomme.)

Celima (Ducharme) Bédard



During Brother André's visit, Celima (Ducharme) Bédard was cured of lockjaw. A family story was told that Nelson, Celima's son, called to his mother over one day to come look at the steam coming out of the kettle where they could see the image of St. Brother André's. (As told to Mary Anne (Bédard) Masse, Celima's daughter.)

Thelma (Dolly) Jeffrey went to visit her dear friend, Valerie Cantin and asked to borrow the wool grey blanket Brother André had used on his bed, so that she could wrap her sick baby in it. The fever left instantly and the child got up, ran and played.



Adelard "Delore" Ducharme was unable to walk because his legs were frail. Brother André rubbed his legs with St. Joseph oil and Mr. Ducharme was able to walk. (as told by Edward Corriveau)



Brother André Remembered

A few memories of Saint Brother André's visits to St. Peter's Parish in St. Joseph have been recorded:

Catherine (Jeffrey) Gregus.

"My mother, Louise Etue, was 11 years old when Brother André first visited St. Joseph in 1917. She spoke often and reverently about her memories of this visit as well as subsequent visits by Brother André. She would relate her impressions of what he said, his method of speech, mannerisms, physical size, etc. as well as how 'holy' he seemed to be. He had a very large, long-lasting impact on her religious beliefs.

Throughout her lifetime she subscribed to the St. Joseph Oratory Annuals. They were always present on her night table. At age 71, her one and only visit to St. Joseph Oratory in Montreal occurred when I was able to take her there in 1977. Edward N. Corriveau, 1917




Edward N. Corriveau (1896-1984), son of Joseph Corriveau and Mathilda Gravelle, had an opportunity to meet with Saint André in 1917. St. André told Edward that he needn't be concerned about going to war because he would return home unharmed. He also reassured Edward that he wouldn't have to kill anyone while overseas. As it turns out, St. André was correct. Edward didn't fire at another person while overseas. The only thing he shot was a pigeon, which he gave to the family he was stationed with in Belgium for their next meal. This gesture wasn't received as hoped, since he'd unknowingly shot their daughter's pet pigeon. On the morning of Nov. 11, 1918, Edward and his battalion were packed and ready to move to the

front lines. The message board in the camp stated that they were to wait as the peace talks were drawing to a close. By 11 o'clock that morning, armistice was

signed and the war had ended. For the remainder of 1918, and part of 1919, Edward and his battalion escorted the German soldiers out of France, through Belgium and into Germany. Since he could speak French, Edward went ahead with a billeting team and acted as an interpreter, arranging for places for the troops to stay at night.
